

# VISION 2020-DISCIPLES ON MISSION

17TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 25TH JULY 2021 - YEAR B

### Living Bread.

Today's liturgy brings together several strands of Old Testament expectation to reveal Jesus as Israel's promised Messiah and King, the Lord who comes to feed His people. Notice the parallels between the Gospel and First Reading. Both Elisha and Jesus face a crowd of hungry people with only a few barley loaves. We hear similar words about how impossible it will be to feed the crowd with so little, and in both, the miraculous multiplication of bread satisfies the hungry and leaves food left over. The Elisha story looks back to Moses, the prophet who fed God's people in the wilderness. Moses prophesied that God would send a prophet like him; the crowd in the Gospel, witnessing His miracle, identifies Jesus as that prophet.

The Gospel again shows Jesus to be the Lord, the good shepherd, who makes His people lie down on green grass and spreads a table before them. The miraculous feeding is a sign that God has begun to fulfill His promise, which we sing of in today's Psalm, to give His people food in due season and satisfy their desires.

But Jesus points to the final fulfillment of that promise in the Eucharist. He does the same things He does at the Last Supper: He takes the loaves, pronounces a blessing of thanksgiving (literally, "eucharist"), and gives the bread to the people. Notice, too, that twelve baskets of bread are left over, one for each of the Apostles.

These are signs that should point us to the Eucharist, in which the Church founded on the Apostles continues to feed us with the living bread of His Body. In this Eucharist, we are made one Body with the Lord. Let us resolve again, then, to live lives worthy of such a great calling.

## Feast of St. Martha - July 29th

“Jesus loved Martha and Mary and Lazarus.” This statement in John's gospel tells us of the special relationship Jesus had with these siblings. Apparently Jesus was a frequent guest at their home in Bethany, a small village two miles from Jerusalem. We read of three visits - in Luke 10:38-42, John 11:1-53, and John 12:1-9.

Many of us find it easy to identify with Martha in the story Luke tells: Martha welcomes Jesus and His disciples into her home and immediately goes to work to serve them. Hospitality is paramount in the Middle East and Martha believed in its importance. Imagine her frustration when her sister Mary ignores the rule of hospitality in order to sit and listen to Jesus. Instead of speaking to her sister, she asks Jesus to intervene. Jesus' response is not unkind, which gives us an idea of His affection for her. He observes that Martha is worried about many things that distract her from really being present to Him. He reminds her that there is only one thing that is truly important - listening to Him.

In Martha we see ourselves, worried and distracted by all we have to do in the world and forgetting to spend time with Jesus. It is, however, comforting to note that Jesus loved her just the same. The next visit shows how well Martha learned this lesson. She is grieving the death of her brother with a house full of mourners when she hears that Jesus has just come to the area. She gets up immediately, leaves the guests, and goes to meet Him.

Her conversation with Jesus shows her faith and courage. In this dialogue she states clearly and without doubt that she believes in Jesus' power, in the resurrection, and, most of all, that Jesus is the Son of God. Jesus tells her that He is the resurrection and the life and then goes on to raise her brother from the dead.

Our final picture of Martha in Scripture is the one that sums up who she was. Jesus has returned to Bethany some time later to share a meal with His good friends. In this home were three extraordinary people. We hear how brother Lazarus caused a stir when he was brought back to life, we hear how Mary causes a commotion at dinner by anointing Jesus with expensive perfume, but all we hear about Martha is the simple statement: “Martha served.” She isn't in the spotlight, she doesn't do showy things, she doesn't receive spectacular miracles. She simply serves Jesus.

We know nothing more about Martha and what happened to her later. But wouldn't it be wonderful if the most important thing that could be said about us is “They served?”

Martha is the patron saint of servants and cooks.
