# Seek first the Kingdom.

The journey of discipleship is a lifelong exodus from the slavery of sin and death to the holiness of truth on Mount Zion, the promised land of eternal life. The road can get rough, and when it does, we can be tempted to complain like the Israelites in this week's First Reading.

week's First Reading.

We have to see these times of hardship as a test of what is in our hearts, a call to trust God more and to purify the motives for our faith. As Paul reminds us in the Epistle, we must leave behind our self-deceptions and desires and live according to the likeness of God in which we are made.

Jesus tells the crowd in the Gospel that they are following Him for the wrong reasons. They seek Him because He filled their bellies. The Israelites, too, were content to follow God so long as there was plenty of food.

Food is the most obvious of signs because it is the most basic of our human needs. We need our daily bread to live. But we cannot live by this bread alone. We need the bread of eternal life that preserves those who believe in Him. The manna in the wilderness, like the bread Jesus multiplied for the crowd, was a sign of God's Providence, that we should trust that He will provide.

These signs pointed to their fulfillment in the Eucharist, the abundant bread of angels we sing about in the Psalm. This is the food that God longs to give us. This is the bread we should be seeking. But too often we don't ask for this bread. Instead we seek the perishable stuff of our everyday wants and anxieties. In our weakness we think these things are what we really need. We have to trust God more. If we seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, all these things will be ours as well.

# St. Dominic, Priest - Feast day August 8th

The saints we remember throughout the year are holy people who lived, and often died, for the Catholic faith and worked to strengthen God's Church on earth. However, the lives of some saints are especially dear to our hearts, and the effects of their actions on the world and our Church are particularly apparent. St. Dominic is one of these saints, and his words and actions eight centuries ago remain in our consciousness today. While the heresies Dominic had to combat were different to those we face, it has never been more important to live and spread the true Gospel of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

St. Dominic was born around 1170, in Old Castile, Spain, to a family of Spanish nobility. He was well educated and began studying at the University at Palencia in 1184. For ten years he studied there, and stood out among his peers. Great things were expected of him. He was concerned with the wellbeing of others, especially the poor, even as a youth. He once sold his own books to provide for the starving and on two occasions even attempted to sell himself into slavery to obtain money for the liberation of captives of the Moors. Happily, this was not accomplished, because God had other work for Dominic to do.

He was trained for the priesthood, and became a canon of a cathedral. When he was about thirty, Dominic accompanied his bishop on several diplomatic missions in northern Europe. In the course of these travels he became aware of the religious ideas of the Albigensians, a movement in southern France which was spreading throughout Europe. They regarded all matter as evil and the creator of the material world as a devil. Hence the doctrine of the Incarnation was denied, and the Old Testament and the Sacrament rejected.

To combat this heresy, the Church commissioned Dominic to be part of the preaching crusade against it. The Pope had sent legates to counteract the movement, but with their sumptuous clothes, fine horses and numerous attendants, they only succeeded in reinforcing the Albigensians' beliefs. Dominic saw that the only way to preach orthodox doctrine effectively was to be as poor as the people and to be thoroughly knowledgeable in Christian theology.

Together with three Cistercians, Dominic began itinerant preaching according to the gospel ideal. His fellow preachers gradually became a community, and in 1215 he founded a religious house at Toulouse, the beginning of the Order of Preachers, (now also called Dominicans, after their founder) with the mission to disseminate true doctrine and combat heresy, especially by means of preaching.

Dominic passed away on August 6, 1221. Pope Gregory IX canonized him on July 13, 1234. He is the patron saint of astronomers and the innocent who are falsely accused of crimes.
