

25TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 22ND SEPT 2024 - YEAR B

Born to Serve.

In today's First Reading, it's like we have our ears pressed to the wall and can hear the murderous grumblings of the elders, chief priests, and scribes who last week Jesus predicted would torture and kill Him.

The liturgy invites us to see this passage from the Book of Wisdom as a prophecy of the Lord's Passion. We hear His enemies complain that "the virtuous man" has challenged their authority, reproached them for breaking the law of Moses, for betraying their training as leaders and teachers. We hear chilling words that foreshadow how they will mock Him as He hangs on the Cross: "If the virtuous is God's son, God will . ..rescue him". The Gospel and Psalm give us the flip side of the First Reading. In both, we hear of Jesus' sufferings from His point of view. Though His enemies surround Him, He offers Himself freely in sacrifice, trusting that God will sustain Him.

But the Apostles don't understand this second announcement of Christ's Passion. They begin arguing over issues of succession, over who among them is greatest, who will be chosen to lead after Christ is killed. Again they are thinking not as God but as human beings, and again Jesus teaches the Twelve, the chosen leaders of His Church, that they must lead by imitating His example of love and self-sacrifice. They must be "servants of all," especially the weak and the helpless, symbolized by the child He embraces and places in their midst.

This is a lesson for us, too. We must have the mind of Christ, who humbled Himself to come among us. We must freely offer Olourselves, making everything we do a sacrifice in praise of His name. As James says in the Epistle, we must seek wisdom from above, desiring humility, not glory, and in all things be gentle and full of mercy.

Saint Pio, Priest: Feast Day September 23

There are saints who have been known for healing, saints who could "read" souls, saints who were known for levitation, who bore the stigmata, were seen in apparition, who had the "odor of sanctity" or who could understand languages they didn't know. But Padre Pio, who died on September 23, 1968, had all these charisms, and more. He was also the first priest to bear the stigmata - the holy wounds of Christ.

Padre Pio was born on May 25, 1887, at Pietrelcina, in the Archdiocese of Benevento, Italy, and given the name Francesco. At sixteen, he entered the novitiate of the Capuchin Friars, where he took the Franciscan habit and the name Pio. In 1907 he made his solemn profession. He was ordained a priest in 1910 but stayed at home with his family until 1916 for health reasons. In September of that year, Padre Pio was hearing confessions when he felt pain in his hands and feet and noticed the stigmata. The bleeding wounds smelled of roses, and although they continued to weep, they never became infected. He was sent to the friary of San Giovanni Rotondo and remained there until his death in 1968.

Word began to spread about Padre Pio's stigmata and people came from far and wide to see him. As his spiritual influence increased, so did the voices of his detractors. Accusations against Padre Pio poured in to the Congregation for the Doctrine of Faith, and by June 1922, restrictions were placed by the Holy See on the public's access to Padre Pio. His daily Mass time was varied each day without announcement to diminish the crowds, and he was ordered not to answer correspondence from people seeking spiritual direction. He was further ordered to desist from all activities except the celebration of the Mass, which was to be done in private. It was also rumored that plans were being made to transfer Padre Pio, but both local and Church authorities were afraid of public riots and he remained at the friary of San Giovanni Rotondo. Despite the restrictions and controversies, Padre Pio's ministry continued.

Finally, in 1933, Pope Pius XI ordered the Holy See to reverse its bans and Padre Pio's faculties were gradually restored. On the level of social charity, Padre Pio committed himself to relieving the pain and suffering of many, chiefly through the founding of the House for the Relief of Suffering which opened on May 5, 1956. Padre Pio placed the Cross of the Lord at the centre of his life and work as his strength, his wisdom and glory. Inflamed by love of Jesus Christ, he became like Him in the sacrifice of himself for the salvation of the world.

For Padre Pio, faith was life; he did everything in the light of faith. Faith led him always to accept God's mysterious will. He was devoted to prayer and passed the day and a large part of the night in conversation with God. He would say: "In books we seek God, in prayer we find Him. Prayer is the key which opens God's heart." On June 16, 2002, Pope John Paul II canonized Padre Pio of Pietrelcina.
