
Lk.17:5-10

Life by Faith.

ecause of his faith, the just man shall live. We hear in today's First Reading the original prophetic line made so central by St. Paul. We are to live by faith in Christ who loved us and gave Himself on the Cross for us.

The world, though, can seem to us as seventh-century Judah seemed to Habakkuk - in the control of God's enemies. The strife and discord we face in our own lives can sometimes cause us to wonder, as the prophet does, why God doesn't seem to hear or intervene when we cry for help.

We can't let our hearts be hardened by the trials we undergo. As the Psalm reminds us, Israel forgot His mighty works, lost faith in the sound words of His promise. They tested God in the desert, demanding a sign. But God didn't redeem Israel from Egypt only to let them die in the desert, and He didn't ransom us from futility only to abandon us in our trials. He is our God and **o** we are the people He shepherds always, though at times His mercy and justice seem long delayed. If we call on the Lord, as the Apostles do in the Gospel, He will increase our faith, stir to a flame the Holy Spirit who has dwelt within us since Baptism.

As Paul tells us in the Epistle, the Lord will always give us the love and self-control we need to bear our share of hardship for the Gospel with a strength that can come from God alone. Our task is to continue doing what He has commanded - to love and to build up His kingdom - trusting that His vision still presses on to its fulfillment, for His vision still has its time.

One day, though we are but "unprofitable servants," we will be invited to eat and drink at our Master's table. It is that day we anticipate with each celebration of the Eucharist.

St. Francis of Assisi - Feast Day October 4th

Francis of Assisi was an Italian Catholic friar, deacon and preacher born circa 1181. He was renowned for drinking and partying in his youth and wanted to be a knight. Fighting in a battle between Assisi and the nearby town of Perugia, Francis was captured and imprisoned for ransom. Released after spending nearly a year in prison, he was still intent on becoming a knight. A call for knights for the Fourth Crusade gave him a chance for his dream. But Francis never got farther than one day's ride from Assisi. He had a dream in which God told him he had it all wrong and to return home.

Returning home without ever making it to battle, Francis was laughed at, called a coward by the people and raged at by his father for the money wasted on armor. Now in his early 20s, he began turning his focus toward God. He spent an ever-increasing amount of time at a remote mountain hideaway as well as in old, quiet churches around Assisi praying, looking for answers, and helping to nurse lepers. During this time, while praying at the church of San Damiano, Francis claimed to have heard the voice of Christ, who told him to rebuild the dilapidated church and to live a life of extreme poverty.

In order to raise money to rebuild the church, he sold a bolt of cloth from his father's shop, along with his horse. His father was furious upon learning of his son's actions and dragged Francis before the local bishop who ordered Francis to return his father's money. Francis took off his clothes, returning both clothes and money to his father, declaring that God was now the only father he recognized. The bishop gave Francis a rough tunic and, dressed in these clothes, he left Assisi. This event is credited as Francis' final conversion. He began preaching around Assisi and was soon joined by 12 loyal followers.

Francis' embrace of Christ-like poverty was a radical notion at the time. He also felt that nature, all God's creations, were part of his brotherhood, and that a sparrow was as much his brother as the pope. His reputation gradually spread all over the Christian world. With his incredible charisma, he drew thousands of followers. They listened to his sermons and many joined in his way of life, becoming known as Franciscan friars and the Poor Clares.

In 1224 Francis received a vision that left him with the stigmata, marks resembling the wounds Jesus Christ suffered when he was crucified, on his hands and in his side. Francis is the first person who received the stigmata, which would remain visible for the rest of his life. Years of wandering and poverty made Francis ill and almost blind. He responded to this blindness by writing the beautiful "Canticle of the Sun" that expresses his brotherhood with creation in praising God,

Francis died on October 3rd, 1226, at the age of 44, in Assisi. Two years after his death, he was canonized on July 16th, by Pope Gregory IX. He is the patron saint of ecologists, honoring his boundless love for animals and nature. St. Francis is one of the most venerated religious figures in history.
