# Synod 2021-2023: Communion/Particpation/Mission

### A Perfect Offering.

esus speaks through the prophet Isaiah in today's First Reading. He tells us of the mission given to Him by the Father from the womb: "The Lord said to me, "You are my servant".

servant".

Servant and Son, our Lord was sent to lead a new exodus, to raise up the exiled tribes of Israel, to gather and restore them to God. More than that, He was to be a light to the nations, that God's salvation may reach to the ends of the earth.

Before the first exodus, a lamb was offered in sacrifice and its blood painted on the Israelites' door posts. The blood of the lamb identified their homes and the Lord "passed over" these in executing judgment on the Egyptians. In the new exodus, Jesus is the "Lamb of God," as John beholds Him in the Gospel today. Our Lord sings of this in the Psalm: He has come, He says, to offer His body to do the will of God.

The sacrifices, oblations, holocausts, and sin-offerings given after the first exodus had no power to take away sins. They were meant not to save, but to teach. In offering these sacrifices, the people were to learn self-sacrifice - that they were made for worship, to offer themselves freely to God and to delight in His will.

Only Jesus could make that perfect offering of Himself. Through His sacrifice, He has given us ears open to obedience and made it possible for us to hear the Father's call to holiness, as Paul says in the Epistle. He has made us children of God, baptized in the blood of the Lamb. We are to join our sacrifice to His, to offer our bodies - our lives - as living sacrifices in the spiritual worship of the Mass.

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### St. Anthony, Abbot - Feast Day January 17th

Anthony's life was not one of observing, but of becoming. He was born in Lower Egypt in AD 251 to wealthy landowner parents who died when he was about twenty. He inherited their three hundred acres of land and the responsibility for a young sister. One day in church, he heard a reading of Matthew 19:21: "If you wish to be perfect, go, sell your possessions, and give the money to the poor......then come, follow me."

Not content to sit still and meditate and reflect on Jesus' words, he walked out of the church and gave away all his property except what he and his sister needed to live on. On hearing Matthew 6:34, "So do not worry about tomorrow", he gave away everything else and entrusted his sister to a convent. He then left to live an ascetic life outside the village, praying, fasting, and performing manual labor. It wasn't enough to listen to words, he had to become what Jesus said. He later headed out into the desert and remained there for 13 years.

Though Anthony himself did not organize or create a monastery, a community grew around him based on his example of living an ascetic and isolated life.

Anthony died when he was one hundred and five years old. A life of solitude, fasting, and manual labor in the service of God had left him a healthy, vigorous man until very late in life. And he never stopped challenging himself to go one step beyond in his faith.

Saint Athanasius, who knew Anthony and wrote his biography said, "Anthony was not known for his writings nor for his worldly wisdom, nor for any art, but simply for his reverence toward God." Athanasius' biography helped propagate Anthony's ideals. Athanasius writes, "For monks, the life of Anthony is a sufficient example of asceticism."

We may wonder nowadays at what we can learn from someone who lived in the desert, wore skins, ate bread, and slept on the ground. We may wonder how we can become him. We can become Anthony by living his life of radical faith and complete commitment to God.

For his importance among the Desert Fathers and to all later Christian monasticism, he is also known as the Father of Monks.
