Kingdom of the Son

Week by week, the Liturgy has been preparing us for the revelation to be made on this, the last Sunday of the Church year. Jesus, we have been shown, is truly the Chosen One, the Messiah of God, the King of the Jews.

Ironically, in today's Gospel we hear these names on the lips of those who don't believe in Him - Israel's rulers, the soldiers, a criminal dying alongside Him. They can only see the scandal of a bloodied figure nailed to a cross. They scorn Him in words and gestures foretold in Israel's Scriptures. If He is truly King, God will rescue Him, they taunt. But He did not come to save Himself, but to save them, and us.

The good thief shows us how we are to accept the salvation Christ offers us. He confesses his sins and acknowledges he deserves to die for them, and he calls on the name of Jesus, seeking His mercy and forgiveness. By his faith he is saved. Jesus "remembers" him, as God has always remembered His people, visiting them with His saving deeds, numbering them among His chosen heirs.

By the blood of His cross, Jesus reveals His Kingship, not in saving His own life, but in offering it as a ransom for ours. He transfers us to "the kingdom of the Son that He loves," as the Epistle tells us. His kingdom is the Church, the new Jerusalem and House of David that we sing of in the Psalm.

By their covenant with David in the First Reading, Israel's tribes are made one "flesh and blood" with their king. By the New Covenant made in His blood, Christ becomes one flesh with the people of His kingdom, the head of His body, the Church.

We celebrate and renew this covenant in every Eucharist, giving thanks for our redemption, hoping for the day when we too will be with Him in Paradise.

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The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary - November 21

The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary commemorates, in the words of the Liturgy of the Hours, "that dedication of herself which Mary made to God from her very childhood under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit who filled her with grace at her Immaculate Conception."

Mary's presentation was already being celebrated in Jerusalem by the sixth century. The Basilica of St. Mary the New was built near the ruins of the Temple in Jerusalem, the reputed place of Mary's presentation, in honor of this mystery. As with Mary's birth, we read of the presentation of Mary in the temple only in apocryphal literature. In what is recognized as an unhistorical account, the *Protoevangelium of James* tells us that her parents Anna and Joachim offered Mary to God in the Temple when she was only three years old in gratitude for being granted a child after years of infertility. When they presented her at the Temple, she stayed willingly, showing her dedication to God even at that young age. When Mary left the Temple at the age of twelve after her betrothal to Joseph, she remained pure and chaste, and at the Annunciation, God came to dwell in her.

Though it cannot be proven historically, Mary's presentation has an important theological purpose. It continues the impact of the feasts of the Immaculate Conception and of the Nativity of Mary; it emphasizes that the holiness conferred on Mary from the beginning of her life on earth continued through her early childhood and beyond. It stresses an important truth about Mary, that from the beginning of her life, she was dedicated to God. She herself became a greater temple than any made by human hands. God came to dwell in her in a marvelous manner, and sanctified her for her unique role in God's saving work. At the same time, the magnificence of Mary enriches us, her children. We too are temples of God and sanctified in order that we might enjoy and share in God's saving work.

The Feast of the Presentation first made its way to the West through monasteries in Southern Italy in the ninth century and by the eleventh century, it had spread to other locales. Under the influence of a French nobleman, Philippe de Mazières, Pope Gregory XI began celebrating the feast during his papacy. Pope Sixtus IV first placed the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary on the universal calendar in 1472, but in the Tridentine reform of the calendar in 1568, Pope Pius V removed the feast. It was restored seventeen years later by Pope Sixtus V, and remains in the Roman calendar today as a memorial.
