SOLEMNITY OF CHRIST THE KING - 22ND NOV 2020 - YEAR A

The coming of the King.

The Church year ends today with a vision of the end of time. The scene in the Gospel is stark, and resounds with Old Testament echoes: the Son of Man is enthroned over all nations and peoples of every language; the nations have been gathered to see His glory and receive His judgment. The King is the divine shepherd Ezekiel foresees in the First Reading, judging as a shepherd separates sheep from goats.

Each of us will be judged upon our performance of the simple works of mercy we hear in the Gospel today. These works, as Jesus explains, are reflections or measures of our love for Him, our faithfulness to His commandment that we love God with all our might and our neighbour as ourselves. Our faith is dead, lifeless, unless it be expressed in works of love. And we cannot say we truly love God, whom we cannot see, if we don't love our neighbour, whom we can.

The Lord is our shepherd, we sing in the Psalm, and we are to follow His lead, to imitate His example. He healed our sickness, freed us from the prison of sin and death, welcomed us who were once strangers to His covenant. He clothed us in baptism, and feeds us with the food and drink of His own body and blood. At "the end," He will come again to hand over His kingdom to His Father, Paul tells us in the Epistle. Let us strive to be following Him in right paths, that this kingdom might be our inheritance, that we might enter into the eternal rest promised for the people of God.

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St. Cecilia - Feast Day November 22nd

Has there ever been a time when music has helped you? Music has a way of helping us express emotions. It can be used for prayer or for play. Some people use music for comfort, or for the enjoyment of themselves and others. It makes sense that this powerful method of expression would be attributed to one of the most famous Roman martyrs of the early church, St. Cecilia, who is venerated in the Catholic, Orthodox and Anglican faiths.

According to legend, she was a noble Roman who, as a child, had vowed her virginity to God. When she was married against her will to the future saint Valerian, then a pagan, she told him that an angel of God wished her to remain a virgin. He promised to respect this wish if he were allowed to see the angel. She replied that he would if he were baptized. On his return from baptism he found Cecilia talking to the angel. She then converted his brother Tiburtius, who also saw the angel.

The brothers became adamant witnesses to Christ, and along with Cecilia distributed alms and buried those who died glorifying Christ. It did not take long for the Roman Prefect Turcius Almachius to notice and condemn them to death. Cecilia was taken before the prefect and condemned to suffocation in the baths of her home. She remained unscathed after spending quite a while in the overheated room, much to the frustration of her captors, and the prefect sent in an executioner to finish the job. The executioner struck her neck three times with a sword in an attempt to decapitate her, but failed with every stroke to separate her head from her shoulders. Cecilia was left to die, bathed in a pool of her own blood. Miraculously, she lived three more days, preaching, converting pagans, favoring the poor, and making arrangements for her house to be dedicated as a place of worship. After her three days of suffering in prayer, St. Cecilia died.

At the beginning of the ninth century, Pope Paschal I discovered her incorrupt relics in the catacomb of St. Praetextatus and had them moved to Rome, to a basilica in Trastevere that now bears her name, believed to be on the site of the house where she lived and died.

She became the patron of music and musicians because was said that, as the musicians played at her wedding, Cecilia "sang in her heart to the Lord". In art she is often represented playing the organ. St Cecilia is one of several virgin martyrs commemorated by name in the Canon of the Mass in the Latin Church.
