The Solemnity of the Holy Family - 31st December 2023 - Year B

Our True Home.

Why did Jesus choose to become a baby born of a mother and father and to spend all but His last years living in an ordinary human family? In part, to reveal God's plan to make all people live as one "holy family" in His Church .

In the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, God reveals our true home. We're to live as His children, "chosen ones, holy and beloved". The family advice we hear in today's readings for mothers, fathers, and children - is all solid and practical. Happy homes are the fruit of our faithfulness to the Lord, but the Liturgy is inviting us to see more, how, through our family obligations and relationships, our families become heralds of the family of God that He wants to create on earth. Jesus shows us this in today's Gospel. His obedience to His earthly parents flows directly from His obedience to the will of His heavenly Eather Joseph and Mary aren't identified by

earthly parents flows directly from His obedience to the will of His heavenly Father. Joseph and Mary aren't identified by name, but three times are called His "parents" and are referred to separately as His "mother" and "father." The emphasis is all on their familial ties to Jesus. But these ties are emphasized only so that Jesus, in the first words He speaks in Luke's Gospel, can point us beyond that earthly relationship to the Fatherhood of God.

In what Jesus calls "My Father's house," every family finds its true meaning and purpose. The Temple we read about in the Gospel today is God's house, His dwelling. But it is also an image of the family of God, the Church. In our families we're to build up this household, this family, this living temple of God, until He reveals His new dwelling

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The Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God - Jan 1st

This feast is a celebration of Mary's motherhood of Jesus. The title was dogmatically adopted to assert that Jesus is God, and that His mother can therefore be called Mother of God. This was the first specifically Marian doctrine to be formally defined by the Church early in the fifth century soon after the Church Fathers had confirmed the fact of Mary's virginity before, during and after giving birth.

In the fourth and fifth centuries, debates about the relationship of Christ's divine and human natures raged in the Church. At the center of this debate was one of the titles of Mary. Since at least the third century, Christians had referred to Mary as *theotokos*, meaning "God-bearer". The term "Mother of God" appears within the oldest known prayer to Mary, the Sub tuum praesidium, which dates to around 250 AD and states: "Under thy protection we seek refuge, Holy Mother of God". This is reflected in the following statement in the Catechism of the Catholic Church:

"From the most ancient times the Blessed Virgin has been honored with the title of 'Mother of God,' to whose protection the faithful fly in all their dangers and needs."

Objection to the title was raised, among others, by Patriarch Nestorius of Constantinople, who suggested that Mary was only the mother of Jesus' human nature, but not his divine nature. This was rejected by the Church and the definition Mother of God was formally affirmed at the Third Ecumenical Council held at Ephesus in 431 AD. The Church affirmed that Christ was fully God and fully human, and these natures were united in one divine person, Jesus Christ. Thus Mary could be called "Mother of God" since she gave birth to Jesus who was fully divine as well as human.

Scriptural basis for the dogma is found in John 1:14 which states "And the Word became flesh, and dwelt among us" and Galatians 4:4, "God sent forth his Son, born of a woman, born under the law". Luke 1:35 further affirms divine maternity by stating: "*The Holy Spirit shall come upon thee* ... wherefore also the holy thing which is begotten shall be called the Son of God."

The dogmatic constitution Lumen Gentium at the Second Vatican Council affirmed Mary as the Mother of God by stating: "The Virgin Mary, who at the message of the angel received the Word of God in her heart and in her body and gave Life to the world, is acknowledged and honored as being truly the Mother of God and Mother of the Redeemer."

Thus, when we celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God we are not only honoring Mary, who was chosen among all women throughout history to bear God incarnate, but we are also honoring our Lord, who is fully God and fully human.
