A Holy Priesthood.

y His death, Resurrection and Ascension, Jesus has gone ahead to prepare a place for us in His Father's house. His Father's house is no longer a temple made by human hands. It is the spiritual house of the Church, built on the living stone of Christ's body. As Peter interprets the Scriptures in today's Epistle, Jesus is the stone destined to be rejected by men but made the precious cornerstone of God's dwelling on earth. Each of us is called to be a living stone in God's building. In this calificate of the Spirit was are to be "a hely priesthead".

Each of us is called to be a living stone in God's building. In this edifice of the Spirit, we are to be "a holy priesthood" offering up "spiritual sacrifices" - all our prayer, work, and intentions - to God. This is our lofty calling as Christians. This is why Christ led us out of the darkness of sin and death as Moses led the Israelites from bondage in Egypt.

God's covenant with Israel made them a royal and priestly people who were to announce His praises. By our faith in Christ's new covenant, we have been made heirs of this chosen race, called to glorify the Father in the temple of our bodies. In the First Reading, we see the spiritual house of the Church

being built up, as the Apostles consecrate seven deacons so they can devote themselves more fully to the ministry of the Word. The Lord's Word is faithful and all His works trustworthy, we sing in the Psalm. So we can trust Jesus when He tells us never to be troubled, but to believe that His Word and works come from the Father. His Word continues its work in the world through the Church. We see its beginnings today in Jerusalem. It is destined to spread with influence and power, and to become the imperishable seed by which every heart is born anew.

St. Matthias, Apostle

The first act of the apostles after the Ascension of Jesus was to find a replacement for Judas. With all the questions, doubts, and dangers facing them, they chose to focus their attention on finding a twelfth apostle. Why was this important? Twelve was a very important number to the Chosen People: twelve was the number of the tribes of Israel. If the new Israel was to come from the disciples of Jesus, a twelfth apostle was needed. But Jesus had chosen the original twelve. How could they know whom He would choose?

One hundred and twenty people were gathered for prayer and reflection in the upper room when Peter stood up to propose the way to make the choice. Peter had one criterion: that the new apostle be someone who had been a disciple from the very beginning. The reason for this was simple - the new apostle must become a witness to Jesus' resurrection. He must have followed Jesus before anyone knew Him, stayed with Him when He made enemies, and believed in Him when He spoke of the cross and of eating His body, teachings that had made others melt away.

Two men fit this description, Matthias and Joseph called Barsabbas. But which one had the heart to become a witness to His resurrection? The apostles knew that only the Lord could know what was in the heart of each. They cast lots in order to discover God's will and Matthias was chosen. He became the twelfth apostle and the group was whole again. Matthias' calling as an apostle is unique, in that his appointment was not made personally by Jesus, who had already ascended into heaven.

St. Jerome and the early Christian writers Clement of Alexandria and Eusebius of Caesarea attest that Matthias was among the seventy two disciples paired off and dispatched by Jesus. Soon after his election, Matthias received the Holy Spirit with the other Apostles (Acts 2:1–4). He is not mentioned again in the New Testament.

It is believed that Matthias ministered in Judaea and then carried out missions to foreign places. Greek tradition states that he Christianized Cappadocia, a mountainous district now in central Turkey, later journeying to the region about the Caspian Sea, where he was martyred by crucifixion and, according to other legends, chopped apart. His symbol, related to his alleged martyrdom, is either a cross or a halberd. St. Helena, mother of Emperor Constantine the Great, reputedly transported Matthias' relics from Jerusalem to Rome.

Originally celebrated February 24th, St. Matthias' feast was transferred to May 14th, so as not to celebrate it in Lent but instead in Eastertide, close to the Solemnity of the Ascension, the event after which the Acts of the Apostles recounts that he was selected to be ranked with the Twelve Apostles.

St. Matthias is the patron of carpenters and tailors.
